St. Barnabas Hosts Grief Coalition During Summer

Weekly meetings of the West Suburban Grief Coalition will be held at St. Barnabas each Thursday through August 26.

The program is the combined effort of fifteen West Suburban area churches and intended to help adults grieving from the death of a loved one, whether that death was three weeks ago, three years ago, or ten years ago. Each week a learning and growing experience is offered through professional speakers, videos and break-out sessions. The break-out sessions are facilitated by volunteers trained in support group facilitation.

Meetings are held each Thursday with a social time from 4 – 4:30 p.m., speaker from 4:30 – 5:00 p.m. and breakout sessions from 5–6 p.m.

Interfaith Outreach Receives Approval to Move to Larger Facility—Seeks to Raise \$2.7 Million by August 15

Over the past 30 years we've been on an exciting journey together. We've found our way, step by step, leap by leap, partner by partner to not only care for one another in times of crises but to remove the barriers that keep struggling families and individuals of our community out of the mainstream and in the margins of their dreams.

We know what works, and as important, we know how to work together-across sectors and systems-to help people move past life crises to new and hopeful futures. We and our community partners find ourselves positioned to take what we know and can do to a whole new level.

We need a place. We've found a place! — the former Erickson New Market, located at Hwy 101 and County Road 6 in Plymouth. This 40,000 sq. ft. facility offers the location, space, accessibility, amenities, and irreplaceable opportunity to develop a holistic, one-stop community service center. A place to come when things go wrong. A place that offers the immediacy, quality, tools, and consistency of care that helps people reframe their future.

We need your help to get us there.

IOCP has launched a "Building for Good" \$5.5 million capital campaign to purchase and

renovate the facility and to provide an operating reserve and contingency fund. The good news is we are half way to our goal! Our purchase agreements put us on a tight timeline to raise the remaining \$2.7 million balance-August 15, 2010. IOCP is an important part of St. Barnabas' ministry. By working through IOCP together with local businesses and neighboring congregations, St. Barnabas is able to "serve our neighbor" in ways far beyond what we could do on our own.

IOCP's capital campaign is St. Barnabas' "Gift of Love" for the month of July.

\$2.7 million is obviously a "big audacious goal", but if the members of all of IOCP's sponsoring congregations contribute in proportion to their means, this goal can be reached. Thanks for your gifts!

Fast Facts about IOCP

- Each year IOCP serves about 1,400 families and individuals living in Hamel, Long Lake, Medicine Lake, Medina, Minnetonka Beach, Orono, Plymouth, and Wayzata.
- IOCP offers programs in 5 areas: housing, employment, child care, transportation, and community connections.
- In the last fiscal year, 9.2% of all households in Wayzata received some form of assistance from IOCP.
- Staffed by volunteers, the IOCP food shelf distributed 807,308 pounds of food in 2009-10 in response to more than 14,000 requests.
- Through broad public and private partnerships IOCP has led the development or renovation of 67 units of affordable housing.
- More than 600 volunteers — from teens to CEOs — are engaged in structured opportunities through IOCP.
 - IOCP is led by a 25-member board of directors and 24 paid staff.
 - The 2010-11 IOCP budget is \$4.88 million.
 - Nearly 90% of IOCP's annual revenue goes directly to services and programs.
 - IOCP's major revenue sources include individuals (34%); in-kind from all constituencies (24%); grants and donor advised funds (20%); businesses, schools, and churches (8%); government grants and contracts (5%); United Way (3%).

Barney's Blarney
