St. Barnabas Hosts Dinner for Nigerian Church Leader August 23

Rev. Dr. Peter Bartimawus, professor at Bronnum Lutheran Seminary in Yola, Adamawa State-Nigeria, will be visiting the United States in August. Dr. Bartimawus received his PhD at Luther Seminary in St. Paul. The Minneapolis Area Synod has a companion relationship with the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria, so there are many congregations in our synod who, like St. Barnabas, have a companion congregation in Nigeria.

To give all of these congregations an opportunity to meet and hear Dr. Bartimawus, St. Barnabas is hosting a dinner on Monday, August 23, at 6:00 p.m.

Members of the St. Barnabas community are encouraged to attend and learn about our companion church in Nigeria. The cost for the meal is \$5.

We need volunteers to plan, prepare, and serve the meal. If you would be willing to help in some way (and get your meal for free), please sign up at the Welcome Center or contact Pastor Wayne (wpeterson@stbarnabaslutheran.org).

Just to refresh your memory, Nigeria is on the west coast of Africa and is almost exactly the size of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, and North & South Dakota all put together. Nigeria is the most populous country in Africa and 8th most populous in the world with almost 140 million people.

Nigeria is organized politically similar to the United States and is divided into 36 states. St. Barnabas' companion congregation, **Church of the Messiah**, is in the town of Hong, located in the state of Adamawa, one of the larger states in Nigeria. It is located on the mountainous eastern side of the country, bordering Cameroon. Hong is just a little north of Yola, where Dr. Bartimawus lives.

Adamawa's area is about 1/6 the area of Minnesota, while its population is about 3/4 that of Minnesota. This makes the population density greater - about 101 people per square kilometer, vs. Minnesota's 21.

Farming is the major occupation in Adamawa and provides employment for about 80% of the working population.

St. Barnabas Rummage Sale - August 14

- A truck loading day on Tuesday, August 17 (time yet to be determined) to send the sale leftovers to The Salvation Army.

If you can help in any of these ways, sign up at the Welcome Center and indicate your availability.

Donations may be dropped off starting Sunday, August 8, at 2 p.m. at **the East Entrance only**. Donations will be accepted only until Thursday, August 12, at 8 p.m. Please make arrangements for proper placement of large items with the volunteers present or talk to Julie in the office, 763-553-1239.

Cherish Our Children is August "Gift of Love"

Cherish Our Children is a national Lutheran ministry of prayer, education, relationship-building, and action to prevent child sexual exploitation.

Cherish Our Children began in the Minneapolis Area Synod and has spread to eleven other ELCA synods. Each synod creates a Task Force or Ministry Team to generate awareness of sexual exploitation as well as provide training and support to congregations.

The heart of Cherish Our Children is in congregations, where leaders work in teams to pray, speak, and act on behalf of children in the congregation and community. Its goals are:

- Congregations will be more aware of young people and their needs.
- Congregations will be more intentional about the care of and support for young people.
- People of all ages will be better equipped to detect and safely address recruitment into sexual exploitation.

- People of faith will lead the effort to dismantle the system of sexual exploitation.

St. Barnabas has been actively involved in Cherish Our Children for three years in three ways:

- Our P.A.L.S. Prayer Ministry (Prayer Advocate Life Saver) by which every child in the congregation is prayed for by an adult each day.
- The J-Term series in Navigator Confirmation where kids and parents together learn about significant life issues.
- Providing free office space to the TreeHouse Ministry that works with at-risk youth in the Wayzata school district.

Additionally, Pastor Chris serves on the Board of Directors of the organization.

Your "Gift of Love" will enable St. Barnabas to meet the financial commitment expected of member congregations.

Summer Experiences

Members of the St. Barnabas community are having some interesting ministry experiences this summer. Three of them have written brief accounts of what they've been up to.

Adam Snyder

Senior at Gustavus Adolphus College

This summer I am out in the state of New York working at the YouthWorks! Adirondack Mountains site. I am one of four staff at the site, and each week we have about 70 participants come to serve in the communities each week.

I am the Work Projects Coordinator for our site, which means that I meet with community members and coordinate where our participants will serve. One of my favorite parts of my job is meeting the community members and hearing their stories. They are no different than any of us, just trying to get by and do the best they can. I have heard some of the most incredible stories of perseverance and also a desire to still give back to the community even when they are struggling. We try to work with the people in most need in the community, as well as help the community as a whole gain more self-esteem.

My job can be very challenging at times, given the few hours of sleep we get each night. But, seeing all that happens in the youth and seeing them literally be the hands of Christ is incredible to see.

Senior at Maple Grove High School

I attended the Augsburg College Youth Theology Institute (ACYTI) in June. It was made of a lot of different kids from different backgrounds. Of the five people I roomed with, two had been or currently were heavy drug users. The week I spent there was full of conversations and people one would just simply not expect to find at a "theology institute." Some students made comments like:

- There is no God.
- There is a God, but he's very far away and couldn't care less about earth and us humans.
- Religion is just something humans have made up to comfort themselves, because we can't deal with this life being all there is.
- Religion makes everything better, until you realize a bunch of scam artists and politicians made it up thousands of years ago.

These are all comments I heard there that will probably horrify and offend the greater portion of the Christian community. But the fact is that many people in our society agree with these statements, so it is beneficial to be stretched and learn how to dialog about these statements. To learn, to grow, one has to be open to dialog with people who think differently than you do.

This is what ACYTI is really all about. They expose you to as many different ways of thinking as possible, in hope that you find one

that you actually agree with. In any event, they want you to be aware of what you really think. It opened the way to more questions for me than answers, but I think most of us agreed that the ACYTI was a good experience.

I can't say that I was forever changed by my experiences there. But, I did grow and learn more about my faith from that week at Augsburg, and it was an experience that I would recommend to anyone who is willing to explore why they believe what they believe.

In July, I was privileged to attend one day of a three-day conference with Pastor Wayne titled, *Rethinking Stewardship: Our Culture, Our Theology, Our Practices*. We were part of a group of over 400 pastors and church lay leaders who gathered at St. Andrew Lutheran Church in Eden Prairie.

We heard from theologians and professors who gave us their insights into stewardship as well as round-table discussions with the other attendees. There were several take-home messages that I would like to share with the St. Barnabas community because this congregation is one of the places where we all practice and live out stewardship. I learned that Christian stewardship goes way beyond the act of giving offerings to our church.

Mark Allan Powell, author of the book *Giving to God: The Bible's Good News about Living a Generous Life* (the book from which St. Barnabas gets its theme of "Duty and Delight"), defined stewardship as "what people who belong to God do, and how they think and act." We learned that in stewardship efforts we look not at what we are doing for God but rather what God is doing in the world through us. Dr. Powell challenged us to move from "faithful giving to faithful living". In other words, we should spend 100% of our money on those things that are pleasing to God. Have you ever considered your mortgage, car payment, utility bills, etc. as uses of your money that are pleasing to God?

Dr. Fred Gaiser, professor at Luther Seminary, reminded us that God is a giver — giving is the nature of God — and that what God is doing is not for sale. Our giving is not a transaction with God. God gives abundantly and we can live out of a sense of abundance, not scarcity. And it is in this abundance that we can share.

Since attending the conference I have been thinking about the stewardship campaigns and programs at St. Barnabas and how God will move us into the future together. One statement made that day keeps returning to me: **"Stewardship campaigns are made by humans, stewards are made by God."** And when we become faithful stewards over the earth, everything can thrive. That's a message filled with hope, but I would not expect anything less from God than hope.

St. Barnabas' Starfish Ministry

Remember the parable of the starfish? In the parable, a little boy is throwing starfish back into the ocean to save them, one at a time. An observer mocks him for thinking he can help all the hundreds of starfish stranded on the beach. "What difference can you possibly make?" taunts the observer.

The boy looks down at the starfish in his hand and then flings it out into the ocean. He responds to the observer, "Made a difference for that one, didn't it!"

The "Starfish" ministry at St. Barnabas provides assistance to individuals and families in need. We are again experiencing a time with many pleas for help. Last month, St. Barnabas gave assistance to six households, helping with rent, gas, food, and clothing.

As a bagpiper, I play many gigs. Recently I was asked by a funeral director to play at a graveside service for a homeless man. He had no family or friends, so the service was to be at a pauper's cemetery in the Kentucky back country. As I was not familiar with the backwoods, I got lost and, being a typical man, I didn't stop to ask for directions. I finally arrived an hour late and saw the funeral guy had evidently gone and the hearse was nowhere in sight.

The only people around were the diggers and cemetery crew and they were eating lunch. I felt badly and apologized to the men for being late. I went to the side of the grave and looked down and the vault lid was already in place. I didn't know what else to do, so I started to play.

The workers put down their lunches and began to gather around. I played out my heart and soul for this man with no family and friends. I played like I've never played before for this homeless man. And as I played *Amazing Grace*, the workers began to weep. They wept, I wept, we all wept together.

When I finished I packed up my bagpipes and started for my car. Though my head hung low, my heart was full. As I opened the door to my car, I heard one of the workers say, "I never seen nothin' like that before and I've been putting in septic tanks for twenty years."
